



2. AUQA QUALITY AUDIT



AUQA Mission

AUQA is the principal national quality assurance agency in higher education with the responsibility of providing public assurance of the quality of Australia's universities and other institutions of higher education, and assisting in enhancing the academic quality of these institutions.



Fitness for Purpose Quality Audit

A systematic, independent determination whether:

- An organisation's planned arrangements are suitable to achieve <u>its goals</u> (i.e. check the overall approach).
- Actual practice conforms to the planned arrangements (i.e. the deployment).
- The arrangements achieve the desired results.
- The organisation is learning and improving from its self-evaluation of its approach, deployment and results.



Audit Scope

- AUQA is interested in all academic activities carried out in the auditee's name.
- AUQA gives some recognition to other forms of external certification when developing its sample and method (re: breadth and depth).
- AUQA does not normally audit non-academic matters unless they are shown to affect academic activities in a manner that warrants attention.



Audit Scope (cont.)

Indicative scope includes:

- 1. Organisational Leadership, Planning etc.
- 2. Teaching & Learning (all modes), Courses etc.
- 3. Research, Consultancies, Community Service, and relations with stakeholders
- 4. Overseas operations
- 5. Internationalisation
- 6. Staff and Staff Support
- 7. Student Support
- 8. Academic Support
- 9. Admin Support, Facilities, Resources etc.



4. Main Audit Stages



Main Audit Stages

- 1. Self-evaluation
- 2. Portfolio: summarising self-evaluation
- 3. Consultation on Panel Membership
- 4. Portfolio Meeting
- 5. Provisions of supporting documentation
- 6. Preparatory Visit: preparing for the Audit Visit
- 7. Audit Visit(s): to verify Portfolio and fill gaps
- 8. Draft Audit Report
- 9. Final Audit Report
- 10. Follow-up Progress Report (+ 1¹/₂ to 2 yrs)



Audit Report

- 1. Commendation: An achievement that is particularly significant
- 2. Recommendation: An area in need of attention and where there is evidence that the auditee has recognised the need
- 3. Affirmation: An area in need of attention



5. Concluding Remarks



Main Characteristics

- 1. Several levels of Quality Assurance
- 2. The national QA system is a reflection of the universities' self-accrediting status
- 3. Audit recognises other quality assurance processes, such as professional accreditation
- 4. Medical professional accreditation is criteriabased. AUQA Audit is based on a fitness-forpurpose approach
- 5. AUQA audit has an improvement focus and provides accountability of the institutional quality
- 6. Public audit reports
